

\$\frac{32}{2}\$ MILLION SCHOOL STARTED IN NORTH KILDONAN: The sod was turned last Thursday afternoon to officially start construction on the new Junior High School immediately adjacent to River East Collegiate in North Kildonan. The school is designed for the new method of team teaching. The central area of the school will be a material resource centre with a large number of rooms coming off of that. Around the outside of the squared donut-type building will be a shops, home economics, music and art rooms, and a theatre with three teaching stations. The school will be built to handle a maximum of 900 students. The cost of the school will be paid for in grants from the Provin-

cial Government. It is expected it will be ready for fall enrollment next September.
