ELMWOOD BECOMES PART OF WINNIPEG

Giving City a Seventh Ward -The Young Suburb is Populous and Progressive.

Yesterday Winnipeg woke up a larger city by about 1,000 acres and a population increased by the addition of about 3,000 persons. The enlargement was brought about by a proclamation of the lieutenant-governor issued in accordance with legislation making ward 1, of the rural municipality of Klidonan, generally known as Elmwood, a part of the municipal corporation of the city. The Manitoba Gazette published on Saturday contains the proclamation which gives birth to ward 7 of the city of Winnipeg on and after the fifth day of March

after the fifth day of March.
Like the city of Winnipeg, Elmwood
has been phenomenally progressive
and where now there is a population of about 3,000 and a good substantial business and residential district there was in 1896 a total population of 40. In that year the district was taken into the rural municipality of Kildonan, being taken from St. Beniface.

In the last assessment the ward was assessed at \$525,000. The taxes will not be altered until 1907, when the new rolls for the city of Winnipeg will include the baby seventh ward. From to-day until the end of the fiscal year the taxes will be paid into the city treasury under the old arrangement, the only change being in the destination of the funds.


