

## East Kildonan Correspondences 1950 – 1971

June 5 1950 – The rent on the wartime houses in Morse Place are to be increased as of July 1 1950

4 room houses without basements \$25.50 per month

4 room houses with basements \$34.50 per month

5 room houses without basements - \$31.50 per month

5 room houses with basements - \$37.50 per month

6 room houses without basements \$33.00 per month

July 8 1950 – Rossmere Golf and Country Club sets the membership fee at \$200.00 per share. No one may hold more than 5 shares and the number of shares is set at a maximum of 350 shares.

August 14 1951 – The official opening of the Curtis Hotel takes place. The \$400,000.00 building has 30 rooms, a beverage room seating 350, two small dining rooms, a large banquet hall seating 350 in the basement and Moore's Coffee Inn. There is parking for 500 cars.

October 7 1951 – The old East Kildonan Municipal Hall the former Bredin home built in 1902 is moved to Winterton to serve as a 2 suite dwelling.

January 6 1952 – The rent for the municipally owned house at 408 Jamison on a 25-foot lot is \$10.00 per month.

March 20 1952 – The official sod turning for Miles MacDonell Collegiate takes place.

July 3 1952 – North Kildonan Ward One residents sign a petition to join East Kildonan as they are dissatisfied with the level of services offered by North Kildonan. The petition is signed by 555 residents over 80% of the property owners who live in the area south of the Bergen Cut Off (Springfield Road) from the Red River to Birds Hill Road (Molson) south to the East Kildonan border at the centre of Oakland.

December 3 1952 – East Kildonan is to be released from the control of the Public Utility Board as of December 31 1952. It had been placed under the control of the Board in 1933 when it had been unable to pay its debenture payments. As recently as 1945 East Kildonan still had a debt of more than \$1,000,000.00 but now the debt is now \$581,955.00.

May 19 1953 – Land bordered by Roch on the west, Watt on the east, the lane south of Dunrobin on the north and Melrose (Kimberly) on the south is set-aside as a recreational area.

December 7 1953 – The surplus land of the Rossmere Golf and Country Club north of Dunbeath and east of Brazier is sold to Kildonan Reality Company for \$8,000.00.

September 23 1955 – Council asks the two East Kildonan's service clubs, the East Kildonan Kiwanis Club and the East Kildonan Lion's Club to promote the erection of a swimming pool facing Chelsea behind Miles MacDonell Collegiate.

September 26 1955 – Traffic counts are made on the Redwood and Louise Bridges over several weeks to obtain average weekday traffic counts.

February 9 1956 – The Radio Oil Refinery complain that there is a considerable amount of vibrations on their property being caused by the sewer construction on Munroe beside their property.

February 22 1956 – Council directs those responsible for issuing building permits to remember that no dwellings without basements are permitted except where there is a utility room at least 10 feet by 15 feet.

March 5 1956 – Rossmere Golf and Country Club is to move the house at 951 Henderson Highway to near the corner of Leighton and Watt to serve as a clubhouse.

April 16 1956 – The Melrose Park Community Club property along with the East End Community Club and land belonging to the Morse Place Community Club is placed under the jurisdiction of the Parks Board.

May 15 1956 – The area east of Neil Campbell School (Centennial Park) is placed under the jurisdiction of the Parks Board.

September 14 1956 – The estimated cost of building a retaining wall along the riverbank from Neil Place to Helmsdale, 2500 feet in length is \$62,500.00.

October 11 1956 – The new A&P Store opens on Henderson Highway beside Lord Wolseley School on the eastern end of the Eldorado Drive In which had closed in 1955.

October 17 1956 – The Manitoba Power Commission pays \$3,493.26 in lieu of taxes for 1956.

October 25 1957 – The Manitoba Power Commission pays East Kildonan \$3,529.43 in lieu of taxes for 1957.

October 7 1958 – The City of Winnipeg thanks East Kildonan for its cooperation and offering to contribute towards the Disraeli Bridge and Freeway.

October 23 1958 – The East Kildonan School District holds a \$600,000.00 money by-law to build a 8 room school on McLeod (McLeod School), a 19 room junior high school in Morse Place (Morse Place Junior High) and a 13 room addition to Neil Campbell School. The money by-law passes 2271-544.

October 28 1958 – The Manitoba Power Commission pays East Kildonan \$3,621.71 in lieu of taxes for 1958.

February 5 1959 – The 1958 staff included Office Staff 22, Public Safety (Police and Fire) 40 and 48 in the Public Works Department for a total of 110 plus the 6 aldermen and mayor.

March 10 1959 – As of March 5 1959 there are a total of 6368 buildings in East Kildonan receiving garbage pickup. As of April 30 1957 the total had been 5649 as of August 31 1953 the total had been 4043 and as of April 1 1952 the total had been 3797.

April 7 1959 – East Kildonan is to spend a total of \$47,500.49 to complete the process of reinforcing the riverbank with loose rock from Lot 90 to Helmsdale.

June 16 1959 – The estimated cost of building the retaining wall along the riverbank from Munroe to Helmsdale is \$66,536.00.

August 18 1959 – The few 25 foot and 30 foot residential building lots left in East Kildonan are selling for \$1,200.00 to \$1,500.00 per lot.

August 24-27 1959 – A large number of East Kildonan residents petition City Council to set up a regional library.

October 15 1959 – The official opening of the Disraeli Bridge is to be held on October 20 1959.

October 28 1959 – Voters approve a by-law to create a Regional Library 1715-731. The vote to build a \$350,000.00 incinerator also passes 1835-476.

October 29 1959 – The Manitoba Power Commission pays East Kildonan \$3,656.23 for 1959.

December 21 1959 – The Provincial Government announces that it will provide \$10,000.00 to help set up a regional library.

December 21 1959 – The C.P.R is to pay \$1,215.01 in a grant in lieu of taxes for its right of way in East Kildonan and it also pays \$65.71 in local improvement charges for 1959.

January 14 1960 – St. Ansgar Lutheran Church pays \$11,157.00 for the property to build Sherwood Park Lutheran Church.

February 9 1960 – The number of individuals on the East Kildonan payroll for some part of 1959 include 32 Office Staff employees, 41 in the Public Safety Department (Police and Fire) and 46 in the Public Works Department for a total 119 plus the mayor and 6 aldermen.

February 29 1960 - An agreement is signed to build an incinerator in East Kildonan (now the Terry Sawchuk Arena). The incinerator will have a capacity of 100 tons per 24-hour period. The initial refuse quantities expected are 25 tons per day. It will have an operating temperature of 2000-degree F. and the total cost of construction will be \$129,980.00. At full capacity the incinerator will release not more than .4 grains per cubic foot of atmosphere at discharge.

August 2 1960 – B.A.M.C. is told by Council not to block or fill in the creek at the northwest corner of Dunrobin and Raleigh and clean out the fill already there, as this is a natural waterway.

August 18 1960 – The first Metro elections are to take place on October 26 1960.

August 22 1960 – There are now temporary barricades to restrict traffic from using the unopened portion of Roch north of the lane north of Colvin.

September 21 1960 – The estimated cost of building a 6 inch thick 24 foot wide concrete pavement on Raleigh from Munroe to McLeod is \$118,381.50. The estimated cost of resurfacing Watt St. with asphalt from the southern limit to Leighton is \$25,000.00.

October 17 1960 – The official opening of the Disraeli Freeway south of the Disraeli Bridge is to be held on October 19 1960.

October 24 1960 – The Federal Government is to pay \$20,000.00 towards the cost of building the incinerator, the construction work is to begin on November 1 1960.

October 26 1960 – Voters approve a by-law to create a Community Centre Board administered by the Parks Board 2510-1580.

October 27 1960 – The Manitoba Power Commission pays East Kildonan \$3,635.14 in lieu of taxes for 1960.

November 28 1960 – The official opening of the addition to Miles MacDonell Collegiate takes place at 8:00 PM. The addition includes a new gym and classrooms facing Chelsea.

January 6 1961 – The Parks Board hires a Recreational Director at \$425.00 per month plus a \$50.00 per month car allowance.

January 17 1961 – The Henderson Regional Library is operating out of temporary quarters at 440 Watt St. The total number of books in the library's possession is 735 at



the end of 1960. The rent will be 50 cents per square foot when the library moves to the Rossmere Shopping Centre.

February 3 1961 – East Kildonan's total water consumption during 1960 was 439,400,000 gallons.

February 7 1961 – The number on the staff of East Kildonan in 1960 included 31 among the Office Staff, 41 in the Public Safety Staff (Police and Fire) and 47 in the Public Works Department for a total of 119.

February 7 1961 – A siren test of all air raid sirens takes place.

March 3 1961 – Streets in East Kildonan under Metro control include Gateway Road from the southern limit to the northern boundary – 1 mile  
Molson St. from Munroe to Birds Hill Road (Panet) - .26 miles  
Munroe from Henderson Highway to Birds Hill Road – 2.18 miles  
Watt St. from southern limit to Leighton – 1.31 miles

April 1 1961 – Henderson Highway is abandoned as a Provincial Trunk Highway as it is taken over by Metro.

May 1 1961 – There are 40 men at work at the incinerator construction project, F. W. Sawatzky is the general contractor for the project

June 5 1961 – Raleigh is to be widened between Ottawa and Munroe.

June 16 1961 – There are a total of 566 fire hydrants in East Kildonan.

June 20 1961 – There are many complaints of low water pressure due to heavy lawn and gardening watering as a result of the hot and dry weather during the period May 19 and May 26 1961. The normal water pressure is to between 50 and 60 pounds per square inch. During one period from 6 PM to 10 PM on May 23 the recorded water pressure had been 5 pounds per square inch. During 3 other periods during this week the recorded water pressure at the East Kildonan boundary had been 10 pounds, 15 pounds and 24 pounds per square inch.

July 21 1961 – The new Henderson Highway feeder watermain is complete; the 16-inch watermain extends from the southern boundary to connect to the 12-inch watermain at Henderson and Munroe.

July 28 1961 – Manitoba Hydro pays \$3,742.83 in lieu of taxes for 1961.

September 11 1961 – The official opening of the incinerator is to be September 13 1961 at 7:30 PM with refreshments to follow at Rossmere Golf and Country Club.

September 29 1961 – The estimated cost of paving Melrose (Kimberly) from the C.P.R. Tracks to Birds Hill Road (Molson) with 8 inch thick concrete 30 feet wide is \$137,262.86, the work is to be done in 1962.

October 27 1961 – The Hydro poles are to be removed from the center boulevard of Henderson Highway at a cost of \$10,973.00 from the southern boundary to the northern boundary.

November 15 1961 – Bronx Park Community Club informs Council that it intends to send a delegation to Council to protest the proposed removal of the 15-mph speed limit on Henderson Highway alongside the club.

November 27 1961 – Estimated incinerator operating costs

Direct operating cost per ton – \$3.04

Capital and maintenance cost per ton - \$1.74

Unforeseen expenses per ton – 22 cents

All non-resident homeowners and businesses are to be charged \$5.00 per ton for garbage disposal. The incinerator is the first in Manitoba to meet the new air pollution standards.

December 3 1961 – The official opening of the Henderson Regional Library takes place at 2:30 PM with Mary Henderson daughter of John Henderson cutting the ribbon and declaring the library open.

December 14 1961 – A \$250,000.00 insurance policy is taken out on the incinerator, which is estimated to be worth \$350,000.00.

January 10 1962 – The cost of installing 91 new 400-watt streetlights on Henderson Highway is \$15,470.00.

February 5 1962 – During 1961 there were a total of 125 individuals on the payroll for at least 1 month. They consisted of 33 Office Staff, 42 Public Safety Staff (Police and Fire) and 50 in the Public Works Department.

March 1 1962 – The paving costs for Pleasant Bay are \$7.80 per foot.

April 25 1962 – East Kildonan receives a maintenance grant of \$1,650.00 from the Provincial Government for 1961 for the 1.65 miles of Henderson Highway in East Kildonan.

August 30 1962 – East Kildonan receives a grant in lieu of taxes of \$3,760.86 for 1962 from Manitoba Hydro.

A total of \$24,697.40 was stolen in 1962 excluding bicycles and cars. The East Kildonan Ambulance took 111 individuals to hospitals in 1962 while 90 other individuals were taken to the hospital in a cruiser car.

There were 302 traffic accidents. There were 22 vehicles impounded and 75 individuals injured in traffic accidents but no one was killed in 1962.

A total of 21 sudden deaths were reported, one case of suicide and 9 cases of attempted suicide.

A Total of 41 individuals were charged with break and enter and there were 1,308 violations of City By-laws.

There were 121 fire calls answered.

Fires with total damage over \$1,000.00 included.

There were a total of 36 men in the Police Department and 16 men in the Fire Department.

February 4 1963 – East Kildonan paid out a total of \$450,151.50 in salaries and indemnities in 1962. There were a total of 138 employees on the payroll at some time during 1962 along with the mayor and 6 aldermen.

February 7 1963 – The Board of the Henderson Regional Library is made up of 2 members from East Kildonan and 2 members from North Kildonan.

The Library has 1 Librarian, 1 Library Assistant, 4 part timers and 9 Pages. At the end of 1962 the library had 11,446 books, it started with 6000 books. In 1962 the library purchased 4606 books and another 750 books were donated. The total number of active borrowers at the end of 1962 numbered 8029 individuals including 3835 boys and girls.

April 2 1963 – Springfield Heights Mennonite Church purchases land at McLeod and Raleigh for \$21,000.00.

July 15 1963 – Rossmere Golf and Country Club is to sell 4 lots on the north side of Roberta, just east of the parking lot.

September 24 1963 – The cost of paving backlanes in 1963 is \$5.30 per foot for each property owner benefiting.

December 12 1963 – The final cost of East Kildonan's contribution towards the building of the Disraeli Bridge and Freeway is \$89,178.52. The bridge and freeway is built at a cost of \$4,900,000.00.

December 23 1963 – The cost of paving the Maxwell Place lane with 6-inch thick concrete and several catch basins is \$1,929.66.

January 13 1964 – The City Auditors recommend that the City buy a cash register for the control of cash in City Hall.

January 17 1964 – The Library Board consists of 6 members, two each from East Kildonan, North Kildonan and East St. Paul.

August 11 1964 – Council is told that the following schools have school sites larger than 4 acres

Miles MacDonell Collegiate – 7.13 acres

Angus McKay – 4.53 acres

Lord Wolseley/John Henderson – 6.27 acres

Polson/Munroe – 11.62 acres

Salisbury/Morse Place – 8.27 acres

September 24 1964 – The rent for the Munroe Library is set at \$1.90 per square foot per year or \$156.00 per month for the 986 square foot library. The cost for renovating the space in the Munroe Shopping Centre is \$3600.00.

October 15 1964 – A Library Assistant is hired at \$250.00 per month.

October 29 1964 – A meeting is held with Metro with the purpose of relocating Highway 59 in Metro Winnipeg.

November 20 1964 – The Library Board turns down the request of East Kildonan City Council to open on Sundays. Patrons are allowed to have 6 adult books on their card or 4 children's books.

December 4 1964 – The hours of the main branch of the Henderson Regional Library are Monday to Friday 10:00 AM to 8:30 PM, Saturdays 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM. Hours for the Munroe Branch Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday 3:00 PM to 8:30 PM, Saturday 10:00 AM to 3 PM.

The Munroe Branch of the Henderson Regional Library opens with 3000 books. This branch is primarily children's library, only 2 books per borrower are allowed and the time a book can be borrowed is shorter.

December 21 1964 – East Kildonan establishes a General Reserve Fund with \$407,860.99.

May 11 1965 – There are a number of complaints about the litter and debris coming from the Munroe Shopping Centre. This has been an ongoing problem for the last 6 years.

May 24 1965 – Rossmere Golf and Country Club hold a fireworks display on the 10<sup>th</sup> Green near the Clubhouse.

June 21 1965 – A brief presented by the East Kildonan Centennial Committee established in January 1964, makes 3 recommendations

1. East Kildonan to contribute towards the Manitoba Centennial Project consisting of a theatre building, museum and planetarium.
2. East Kildonan is to proceed with the construction of a recreational centre within its own boundaries designed for cultural and recreational purposes
3. East Kildonan to authorize the writing and publication of a history of the Red River Settlement.

The recreational and cultural centre would be built on the 27 acres of land on Kimberly west of the incinerator now used as a landfill site. The major building is to be an enclosed arena with artificial ice. The building is also to be used for public gatherings and other displays all seasons of the year. Other facilities to be included a large parking lot for 600 cars, football and soccer fields, a track, tennis courts and a bowling green. Future projects include a library and museum building.

August 1965 – B.A.M.C. is to sell 18 acres of land for the new Concordia Hospital for \$100,000.00.

August 3 1965 – Manitoba Hydro pays \$4,247.34 in lieu of taxes for 1965

October 21 1965 – Bronx Park Community Club thanks Council for the quick removal of the debris left over from the fire at the community club.

March 17 1966 – The Henderson Regional Library signs a reciprocal agreement with the Winnipeg Public Library allowing the patrons of each to use and take books out from the other. The agreement comes into effect on April 1 1966. The Board discusses emergency measures if the expected Red River flood is worse than expected. If the floodwater reach 28 above datum the library would have to be evacuated from its basement location in the Rossmere Shopping Centre. The John Henderson Junior High Gym is considered as a possible relocation site. The Library had earlier been closed March 4 and March 5 1966 because of the blizzard.

April 11 1966 – A contract is signed with Mr. Gwain Hamilton to write a history of East Kildonan for a sum of \$2,000.00 plus \$4,000.00 in travel expenses. The book is expected to cost \$5.00 per copy. It is to be completed by February 1 1967. It is to be called "History of the East Bank of the Red River" It is to include

- A. Capsule history of the Selkirk Settlement
- B. Extension of the Selkirk Settlement to the east of the Red River
- C. Place names of City and historical connotation
- D. Pioneer Families
- E. Municipal Development
- F. First Schools and Educational Development
- G. Churches and Church Organizations
- H. Service and Fraternal Organizations

The manuscript is deemed to be incomplete and lacking in material relating to events of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century and is never completed and never published.

June 20 1966 – Metro Council considers building a new metro route running in a east-west direction immediately north of Simpson and south of the hospital site from Highway 59 (Concordia).

June 20 1966 – Negotiations end and planning begins to build a new 200 Concordia Hospital with an initial 200 beds to replace the 80-bed hospital in Elmwood. The new hospital is expected to cost \$4,500,000.00 with the work to begin in 1968 with the opening planned for 1969.

July 29 1966 – Manitoba Hydro pays East Kildonan \$4,183.64 in lieu of taxes for 1966.

September 9 1966 – The estimated cost of installing 2 flashing light crossing signals and one bell on McLeod Avenue over the C.P.R. Tracks is \$11,600.00 with annual maintenance charges of \$635.00 per year.

February 27 1967 – Curb repair costs are \$1.25 per foot and sidewalk repair costs are \$2.15 per foot. The cost of snow removal for 1967

July 21 1967 – A meeting is held with St. Boniface, St. Vital, North Kildonan, Transcona and East St. Paul to consider a reciprocal fire agreement between the municipalities.

September 28 1967 – Manitoba Hydro pays East Kildonan \$4,497.24 in lieu of taxes for 1967.

October 26 1967 – Alderman Michael Ruta 2653 to 2299 defeats Mayor Suttie and 2 other aldermen are defeated over Council's attempts to build a new Public Safety Building.

November 14 1967 – The East Kildonan Fire Fighters Association receives a 16.5% increase. Salaries are now

May 13 1969 – The Provincial Government gives permission to transfer \$200,000.00 from the General Reserve Fund to General Funds to build the new fire hall on Kimberly after the voters reject a money by-law to build a new Public Safety Building. The Public Safety Building was to have housed the Fire Department and Police Department.

May 15 1969 – A joint meeting is held with North Kildonan to discuss forming an amalgamated city to be called the City of Kildonan. Plans call for the administration to be handled from the East Kildonan City Hall. The police are to use the North Kildonan Municipal Hall. A satellite fire hall is to be built in North Kildonan. Financial costs were discussed and it was estimated that police costs would be \$7.00 per capita.

June 18 1969 – The Community Recreational Centre money by-law for \$395,000 is defeated, For 1522 Against 1966.

June 23 1969 – The Liquor Control Commission pays East Kildonan \$1,440.00 in lieu of taxes for 1969.

June 24 1969 – East Kildonan reports a deficit of \$10,172.55 in the water and sewer utility budget for 1968. A 10-cent per foot frontage levy is put on all property with watermains to eliminate the deficit.

July 8 1969 – A burglar alarm system is installed in Miles MacDonell Collegiate and Morse Place Junior High to prevent any further break-ins. The 2 systems are tied into the East Kildonan Police Station.

July 16 1969 – The sod turning ceremony for the Bethania Mennonite Personal Care Home on Kimberly/Concordia.

August 5 1969 – East Kildonan receives a per capita grant of \$8.00 per capita or \$230,368.00 from the Provincial Government based on the 1966 census. Prior to 1968 the grant was \$3.00 per capita.

August 11 1969 – Manitoba Hydro pays East Kildonan \$4,948.95 in lieu of taxes for 1969.

October 22 1969 – Voters turn down a by-law to abolish the Park Board. For 1653 Against 2733.

January 19 1970 – East Kildonan Council protests the proposed increase of the Metro Council Chairman's salary from \$4,800.00 per year to \$16,800.00.

March 26 1970 – Margaret Kennedy of 770 Brazier is to write a 350-page history of East Kildonan for the Manitoba Centennial. She is to be paid \$1,500.00 for her work (The work is never completed and nothing is ever published).

April 1 1970 – The Provincial Government informs all Greater Winnipeg Municipalities that all officials for municipal and school board elections up for re-election in 1970 have had their extended until the end of 1971 as elections have been postponed.

May 4 1970 – The River East School Division announces that it plans to film the Festival of the Arts in River East Schools and other local locations over several months at a cost of \$400.00.

May 8 1970 – East Kildonan asks the Board of Transport to re-open the old Highway 59 (Panet/Molson) as a service road. Many businesses and residents have complained that the closing of the roadway has greatly business and made it difficult to travel in the area.

June 8 1970 – The East Kildonan Centennial Ball held at Rossmere Golf and Country Club on May 11 1970 had total revenue of \$4,456.00 and expenses of \$5,636.16 for a net loss of \$1,180.16.

June 18 1970 – The Centennial Committee announces it is holding a parade on August 3 1970 beginning from the Munroe Shopping Centre, west on Munroe to Henderson then to Fraser's Grove to Fraser's Grove Park. The assembly is between 9 AM and 10 PM.

July 3 1970 – The 1100 Block of Moncton is to be closed on August 15 1970 so block residents can hold their "Know Your Neighbour" day.

September 10 1970 – Fleming Avenue is to be closed between Gateway and London for residents to celebrate "Fleming Centennial Whoopla".

September 14 1970 – Pleasant Bay is to be closed starting at 6 PM on September 18 1970 so the residents can have a get together.

October 12 1970 – The East Kildonan Variety Show is held at the Concert Hall.

November 9 1970 – East Kildonan Council decides that its 1970 Centennial projects will be 3 wading pools built at Morse Place Community Club, Bronx Park Community Club and East End Community Club at a cost of \$29,854.00. The work is to be done by the Tyndall Construction Company in the spring of 1971. Council also considers building

wading pools at Melrose Park Community Club and McLeod Avenue Community Centre for \$22,000 but these are never built.

November 20 1970 – The total East Kildonan water consumption from October 1 1969 to September 30 1970 is 634,437,875 gallons of which 631,653,000 gallons from the watermain and 2,784,875 gallons from wells.

December 29 1970 – The East Kildonan Centennial Committee tells Council that it had spent \$10,860.02 in 1970 to celebrate the Manitoba Centennial. The Centennial Committee had consisted of 13 sub committees overseen by a chairman and a secretary. There were a total of 44 members of the Centennial Committee with local groups represented on the committee. The sub committees consisted of
