tion be granted, as follows:

Kildonan West—To be bounded on the east by the Red River, on the west by the four-mile limit, on the north by the north line of James Murray's fot, and on the south by the south line of Donald Matheson's lot.

KILDONAN EAST—To be bounded on the west by the Red River, on the east by the four-mile limit, on the north by the north line of S. Henderson's lot, and on the south by the south line of John Mc-Phail's lot.



The Manitoba Labor Board today announced a public hearing for June 22 to hear representations on an application by a Winnipeg building supply firm to continue a 50-hour week for its employees.

The application is a variation from provisions of the recently enacted Hours of Work Act which comes into effect July 1.

The Act provides for a 48-hour week for male workers and 44 hours for women workers with + pay at rate-and-a-half schedules of work in excess of eight hours per day.

The labor board may in particular circumstances grant partial or general exemption to a firm, or to the whole or part of an industry and may allow additional daily or weekly hours or work at regular TREES.

One building supply firm has applied to the board (or variation) of the terms of the legislation. The application has been jointly filed; by the company and the union representing its employees.

## East Kildonan School Board To Support Referendum

Political expediency reared its ugly head at the December meeting of the East Kildonan School Board in relationship to the March 10th referendum on a single grades 1-12 school board for this area.

Whether the proposed consolidated school district would add additional taxes to the already heavily burdened ratepayers seemed to be secondary to Chairman J. MacKay and Trustee Mrs. Y. Templin.

Primary concern at School Board meeting was the possibility of being elected to the new School Board should the ratepayers pass the March 10th referendum. ·· "If we come out opposed to

the new consolidated school district, we will not be able to elect a single member from our School Board (East Kildonan 14) to the new River East Board," stated Mrs. . Templin.

Earlier Chairman MacKay had lyricized that he thought it "highly unfair" that he had "just finished campaigning to win a School Board seat in October and have to do it all over again in March".

In a palpably political statethe East Kildonan School Board went on record that it thought such a proposed consolidated School should be within the boundaries of East Kildonan, but

that it would support the River East referendum.

Chairman MacKay suggested speaking engagements

favoring the referendum be postponed until after the provincial budget is brought down.

To protect themselves from the ire of those in favor of the consolidation, the School Board appointed an Information Committee composed of Trustees Templin and D. F. Anderson under the guidance of Chairman MacKay. committee will issue statements favoring the government proposal.

The only outward opponent to the consolidation with River East is Trustee A. Rouse, who said he would offer his complete views at an early date."
