Sydney Fisher, acting minister of public works at Ottawa, regarding for the Redwood width of spans bridge. The government has definitely refused to agree to the original plans. The letter reads as follows: D8 "Since speaking to you about the approval of plans of the Redwood avenue bridge over the Red river in the lower part of the city of Winnipeg, I have had an opportunity of discussing these plans with the resident engineer, ės. Mr. Dufresne. I regret to say, after thorough investigation with him, I find that the objections to the bridge as planned by to to tthe city are even more serious than had thought. "In conversation Mr. Dufresne formed me, not only that he could not honestly modify his opinion that these plans are inimical to the safe navigať: tion of the Red river at that point, but that he feels he went as far as he possibly could go in his report to the ţ٠ b( department. 8 Since seeing you, I have also had Ų, a protest on the part of the shipping Βi interests against the plan of this bridge, and it is evident to me that those who are most familiar with the navigation of this river and the most ir a O. intimately concerned with it, as the engineer of the department, are continions that the ė. positive in their opinions ! that bridge as now being constructed would seriously interfere with navigation. þ This will also be much more serious f when navigation increases, as it surely will when the St. Andrew's locks im-1r άl provements are completed.
