



FRENCH FLEET IN ADRIATIC IS BUSY

Paid Visit to Ragusa, But Civic Officials Did Not Wait-Destroyed Lighthouse.

Bordeaux, Oct. 9 .- According to an official announcement made by the French government today, the French fleet, commanded by Vice-Admiral street at the intersection of Higging avenue and Maple street at noon yes-Boue de la Peyers, after re-victualling the garrison at the Montenegrin sea-port of Antivari, visited the islands in the Adriatic between Cattaro and Lissa. Later the French warships appeared

before Ragusa and Gravosa.

The Austrian authorities and other notables at Ragusa fied precipitately on two special trains as soon as the battleships were sighted.

"The Italian and Slav population."

"The Italian and Slav population," the official announcement says, "remained calm. It would have been easy to reduce Ragusa to cinders if our fleet had been willing to follow the example of the Germans. The flight of the authorities was sufficient.

"The French squadron merely destroyed the lighthouses and the wireless apparatus at Gravosa."

ADMITS CANNOT GIVE PROOF OF ATROCITIES

Copenhagen, Oct. 9 .-- The "Vossische Zertung" admits that no proof of atrocities has been found against the Russian General Martos, who was transported through Germany .1 chains. According to a German official state-ment, issued on Lept. 18, General Mar-
